Meet Chestnut the Eurasian Otter!

Sadly Franklin, our Eurasian Otter who lived in the Main Building, passed away earlier in the summer, aged 9. He is sorely missed by all the keepers and staff at NFWP and the visitors who enjoyed spying him asleep in his 3 little windows looking into his sleeping holt!

If you've visited recently you may have noticed a new furry face in Franklin's old enclosure! We are very excited to introduce Chestnut, who is Franklin's son! Born to Millie and Franklin here back in January 2018!

Chestnut takes after his dad in so many ways, he likes to snooze in his inside holt, loves an afternoon swim and of course is extremely handsome!

Chestnut is named after the Chestnut Centre, in Derbyshire, which was the family's first centre (opened in 1984 – closed in 2017). He is the first born otter cub here after the Chestnut Centre closed.

Wild Boar have moved residence to the Paddocks!

Conservation and Rescue work

We have some otterly great stuff going on!

From the 19th to the 23rd of September 2022 our Curator, Jason Palmer, attended the 15th International Union for Conservation of Nature, Species Survival Commission, Otter Specialist Group congress. Held this year in Sospel, France, it was a chance for otter experts from all over the world to come together to share and promote the amazing work that is going on around the world for all 13 species of otter. Delegates from countries including Singapore, Japan, South Africa, Argentina, India and even Bhutan were all in attendance.

Jason, as an IUCN OSG global species advisor for Asian Short Clawed otters, spoke about the ongoing work we do for the global captive population of this species.

Here at the New Forest Wildlife Park, we are proud to be championing the four species of otter we look after!









On the 7th August, we had an unusual rescue and release... of Stag Beetle Larvae!

We were contacted by Chrissy who came across the larvae while removing a rotten tree from her garden. Chrissy knew that Stag beetles have been declining in numbers, so wanted to make sure they were relocated somewhere safe! That's where we were able to help, we were more than happy to home the larvae by some rotting oak in one of our dedicated wildlife areas.

The adult Stag beetle is instantly recognisable as it is the largest UK insect with antler like jaws! They spend three to seven years in the ground as larvae, emerging once fully grown and living only a few months as an adult beetle.



Building Work continues in the Deer Encounter

After Storm Eunice back in February created 14 fallen trees and 3 more felled, the clear up work has been extensive. With the loss of our enclosure for the Scottish Wildcats and one of our Pine Marten enclosures too.

The work of the dedicated maintenance team continues after the removal of these two enclosures, lots of tree surgery and the continued construction of the new otter enclosure – opposite the Giant Otters.



Bat Rescue

In early September, one of our keen-eyed visitors spotted a bat in need of help on one of our trees in the car park and alerted the Keeper team!



After a very supportive phone call to the Bat Conservation Trust and a return call from our local support Hampshire Bat Group, this Brown Long-eared Bat was safely moved by the Keepers, Lizzy & Tom, into a suitable transport box. Keeper Shanna transported the bat directly to our local Bat Carer, Lena, based in Totton! We received the wonderful update this week that the Long-Eared Bat is doing well and responding to specialist care & treatment. Once flight assessments are undertaken in the coming weeks, Lena hopes for a successful release back onto our site!
